7	WHEREAS this matter came on for consideration by the Court upon
8	recommendation of the New Mexico Children's Court Improvement
9	Commission, Administrative Office of the Courts, and the Family Representation
10	Task Force to create the New Mexico Family Representation Commission as an ad
11	hoc advisory commission of this Court;
12	WHEREAS, New Mexico courts are statutorily required to provide legal
13	representation to all children, parents, guardians, and custodians involved in abuse
14	and neglect cases;
15	WHEREAS, high quality legal representation for children and parents in
16	abuse and neglect cases is needed to ensure due process and procedural fairness; to
17	improve judicial decision-making by providing the court with accurate, timely, and
18	complete information about children and parents; and to create better long-term
19	outcomes for children and their families, including higher rates of reunification and
20	reduced time to permanency;
21	WHEREAS, this Court is committed to increasing the quality of legal Page 1 of 8

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WHEREAS, the Administrative Office of the Courts has managed the representation of children and parents since 1993 through its Court Appointed Attorney Program with funds allocated by the New Mexico Legislature;

WHEREAS, the New Mexico Children's Court Improvement Commission, in conjunction with the Administrative Office of the Courts, has been working since its inception for decades to improve legal representation for all parties in abuse and neglect cases by (1) centralizing administration of the Court Appointed Fee Fund and has developed a model contract to which the Administrative Office of the Courts is a party; (2) developing performance standards for court-appointed attorneys that have been adopted by this Court; (3) securing some increased funding for court-appointed attorney contracts; (4) developing a model for a youth attorney for children fourteen years of age and older, which has included drafting and supporting changes to the New Mexico Children's Code to implement that model and hosting a summit for youth attorneys to clarify the model and answer ongoing questions; (5) establishing the Corinne Wolfe Children's Law Center (now the Corinne Wolfe Center for Child and Family Justice) that provides attorney training and the Child Welfare Handbook; (6) providing the annual

Children's Law Institute; (7) creating appellate-respondent attorney positions and secured funding for those positions; and more;

WHEREAS, in 2013, the Children's Court Improvement Commission conducted a study of the quality of representation in abuse and neglect cases to identify issues of concern, possible solutions, and recommendations for the Court Appointed Attorney Fund. The study found that many children's court judges and clients had concerns about the attorneys not meeting with their clients, lack of preparation for hearings, not monitoring progress on case plans, and an overall lack of trial skills. Additional barriers identified were high caseloads, inadequate and inequitable compensation, and lack of support services and resources;

WHEREAS in 2018 the Children's Court Improvement Commission, in conjunction with the Administrative Office of the Courts and the American Bar Association Center on Children and the Law, conducted an assessment of the quality of representation for children and parents and found that major challenges include inadequate funding, inadequate oversight, poor attorney retention, and lack of diversity and cultural humility. The assessment concluded that the current system of representation was inadequate and failed to provide the type of representation parents, youth, and children in New Mexico deserve. The assessment recommended that a task force be formed focused on improving the quality of representation with three main roles: analyzing the current system in New

WHEREAS in 2019 the Children's Court Improvement Commission successfully advocated for a Family Representation Task Force to be created by Senate Joint Memorial 10 during the 2019 regular legislative session to recommend models of legal representation of children and parents in children's court proceedings on abuse and neglect and to improve outcomes for children and parents served my New Mexico's children's legal system;

WHEREAS, the Family Representation Task Force concluded its work with recommendations including a multi-phase process to (1) create an independent agency to centralize and oversee the representation of children and respondents in children's court proceedings on abuse and neglect, (2) develop interdisciplinary legal team services and a practice model for high quality representation, and (3) create agency infrastructure to support high quality legal representation;

WHEREAS, the implementation of the recommendations of the Family Representation Task Force requires continued work by experts on children's law, such as those persons that made up the Family Representation Task Force; and

WHEREAS the Court having considered said recommendation and being sufficiently advised, Chief Justice Michael E. Vigil, Justice Barbara J. Vigil, Justice Judith K. Nakamura, Justice C. Shannon Bacon, and Justice David K. Page 4 of 8

2	NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED that the Ad Hoc New Mexico Family
3	Representation Commission IS HEREBY ESTABLISHED as an advisory
4	commission to the Court dedicated to improving the quality of legal representation
5	to children and parents in abuse and neglect cases by advancing the
6	recommendations of the Family Representation Task Force;
7	IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the New Mexico Family Representation
8	Commission shall convene to organize and meet, thereafter, as necessary at the call
9	of the chair or at the request of a majority of the commission members;
10	IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Commission shall be composed of a
11	chair and nineteen (19) members representative of experts on children's law
12	throughout the bar, judiciary, and justice community;
13	IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the following persons are appointed as
